1. Call to order

2. Motion to Accept 2018 Minutes

3. Introduction of Current Board Members
 - a. Board members introduced themselves and indicated the various sub-committee liaison and executive positions they hold.
4. President's Report – Glen Dyck
 - a. Presented – see attachment
 - Thanks extended to all those who are in attendance given the circumstances. Thanks also extended to all board members and sub-committee members.
 - Michelle Pinette has been with the board for three and a half years, and Paul Gillis has been with the board for two years- their terms were up in April and stayed on until the Annual General meeting.
 - The 2019/2020 year started off successfully, great AGM, more than one hundred kids participating in spring sports, pickleball three times per week, introduced karate, no-cost early child playgroup, studio 26 offering Zumba and Monkeynastics, private rentals, End of Summer Bash & Kid's Carnival, and two two-hundred sittings at the fall supper. Many thanks to all the volunteers.
 - Many grants were applied for, not all were successful. Thanks to Penny and a long-time supporter by Community Futures. The funding they provided allowed the board to continue with renovation

plans. A grant from Noventis and donation from the RM allowed the board to have the hockey rink paved. This was an important initiative, thank you to Joerg for spearheading.

- In mid-March 2020 COVID-19 hit and everything changed. The board closed the community club doors on March 16th for six months. In August 2020 the board contemplated partially opening the club but Manitoba witnessed a spike in cases leading to the board's decision to keep the club closed until October 1st, 2020 and re-evaluate then. The board did not want to underestimate compliance steps, and in evaluating a potential reopening, the cleaning, sanitizing, and other compliance steps seemed too much for a group of volunteers. The board has continued to have monthly virtual meetings via Zoom. Please stay tuned via social media and on our website for new updates.
- The board encourages community members to please provide feedback and suggestions, all contributions are appreciated. Thanks to Terry for chairing yet another AGM. Gratitude expressed to the board for sticking together this year.

5. Financial Report – Rita Tully

- a. Details of the profit and expense report reviewed.
- b. The club ended December 31, 2019 without losing or making money. The prime objective as good stewards is to break even which the board was able to achieve.
- c. Thanks to Theresa Montgomery for auditing the reports. She rose up to the occasion.
- d. In Rita's first year of term, the bookkeeping system was converted to Wave and all processes now use Wave. Online payments are accepted through Wave. This has decreased handling of cash and cheques.
- e. A paperless documentation was implemented and future plans are to expand the system. Sports registrations were completely online including payment creating efficiencies and convenience. This will be the new norm for large scale registrations of this nature.
- f. Creating budgets for each committee is a goal for the future when things are more predictable. But in the meantime current financial statements have a comparative from the previous year.
- g. Appreciative of the support from the RM and residents of the community.

6. Sub-Committee Reports

- a. Events - Lorraine Frieboth

- This is the first board Lorraine has been on and was intimidated by the formality. But, after the first year, she realized that it is simply a group of people working together and volunteering time. It's quite fun! The community club held many events this year.
 - Kristi Braun led the community craft sale.
 - The board partnered with the Historical Society and the local Girl Guides group to put on the Remembrance Day Luncheon.
 - In the winter the club hosted a breakfast with Santa and two lunch skate dates.
 - The club obtained a liquor license this past year which allows flexibility in what events and gatherings the club can offer.
 - Since COVID-19 the events committee has struggled on how to continue to host events to raise funds and how to keep a sense of community togetherness while socially distancing. Thanks to those who participated in the coffee campaign. All money raised is going directly to the community club. Headingley library will team up with the club to do a story book walk/bike pathway once the idea is approved by the RM. A clothing campaign is being looked into, but nothing is confirmed yet. The events committee encourages all community members to send ideas on how to keep momentum and togetherness during these times. Please email sfxccevents@gmail.com.
- b. Fundraising & Grants - Joerg Zimmermann
- Six grants were applied for the year, and three were successful. Thanks to Penny at Community Futures, Noventis, and the RM of St. Francois Xavier. These grants allowed for the paving of the rink as well as the ability to further the club renovation plans.
 - Fundraising for the club is necessary otherwise basic costs cannot be covered. The board's major aim for fundraising will be for renovations. In order to apply for large grants to help cover renovation costs, the club needs to set aside money as many grants require matching funds given.
 - The club can survive with COVID-19 hampering events that would otherwise provide fundraising due to a small reserve. However, capital projects will not go forward without fundraising.
 - The fundraising and grants committee encourages anyone to join the board or the committee that would have an interest and desire in writing grants or fundraising.
- c. Maintenance - Paul Gillis
- The committee has been responsible for the upkeep of the building and keeping it operational. Currently there is only one committee member and new members are needed. There are large fixes in the

near future, the heating system being one. Thank you to all the volunteers over the past year.

d. Programs - Glen Dyck

- The programs that had been offered this past year were outlined in the President's message. This is the second year working with the programming committee.
- Kids in the community enjoyed various programming: spring sports, playgroup, Monkeynastics, and karate. Pickleball continued to be a longstanding program in the community meeting three times per week.
- Hockey rink shinny open to all community members. The rink lights are accessible, and the warm up shack is always open. Looking forward to programming opportunities the paved rink will provide the community.
- The club hosted a Blood Donor Drive last October. Unfortunately the January Blood Donor Drive was cancelled due to the club being too cold. There were challenges with the furnaces keeping up to the frigid weather.
- Thanks extended to the sub-committee. 2020 spring sports were set up and refunds to 100+ people needed to happen due to COVID-19. Thanks to Lori Dyck, Janis Fleury, and Amber Dyck who helped. The online system worked well, making the refunds simpler than it could have been.

e. Rentals - Stephanie Carvalho

- First year on the board, and there weren't a tremendous amount of rentals. March 15th was the last rental before the club was closed due to COVID-19.
- Continue to use the walk-through checklist system.

- Rentals are closed until October 1st, however if there is a date you would like to reserve after October 1st, please be in touch and your reservation will be put in the calendar in case the club opens.

f. Rink & Grounds - Joerg Zimmerman

- The paving of the rink was the highlight of the year. It improved the way of flooding the rink making it fairly easy this year as elevation issues did not need to be covered to make the ice level.
- Many volunteers helped out with flooding the rink and clearing the ice including a few that can now run the Zamboni.
- The rink lights were on quite a bit last winter, and the rink seemed to have a good amount of usage.

- Over the summer there were quite a few kids playing roller hockey which achieved the goal of increased use of the rink.
- Events aren't possible right now but otherwise the End of Summer Bash would have been held on the asphalt.
- Other ideas for the future include a skate park or possibly tennis in the summer. The RM has agreed to equip the club with fibre internet creating a possibility of viewing sporting events.
- Over the summer, some trailers were parked on the club grounds which is not typically something the club would allow. However when Maple Leaf approached the club to park some trailers, the board voted in favour as it recouped some income loss due to COVID-19. The trailers should be gone by the end of the week.
- The ice will go in the rink to ensure the community has an outdoor place to be active. The plan is to have the ice in fairly early. However, the board will have to evaluate whether the warm-up shack will be opened or not.
- The rink and grounds committee is hopeful to have a maintenance day this fall depending on COVID-19.
- Thanks to everyone that volunteered and helped to make the rink successful. Community members are encouraged to help out on the committee to shovel snow, clear the rink, and maintain the Zamboni. Every little bit helps. Please be in touch with sfxclub@gmail.com to volunteer.

g. Social Media - Ashley Reay

- Ashley joined the board because she was newer in the community and found volunteering was a great way to meet new people.
- The website recently went live with a new platform from godaddy to weebly. This change will save time and money, providing a more professional look and allowing more applications. The plan is to evolve the website more and make information more readily available at www.sfxcc.com. Please feel free to reach out to the social media committee on the contact page.

h. Renovations - Joel Martens

- The renovations committee has made positive gains to further renovations of the club. The board has an idea of what work is wanted but solid plans are needed to further determine overall project costs.
- In your package, there are two renderings that were completed by Denis Fleury, a local community member. He has been paid and also donated time to complete these plans. Many thanks to him.
- The fundraising committee would like to stress that these are plans, but changes can be made with community input. The priority has been finding ways to keep existing systems (ie. mechanical and

electrical) to keep costs down all the while creating a more user friendly and updated space.

- There is a lot of work to do in terms of fundraising. The committee is looking at a phased approach to keep costs manageable. Looking forward to assistance from community members in the future.

7. Penny from Community Futures Plains

- a. Penny works with a lot of committees and she feels that the SFXCC board is one that does this because they love the community and being involved. She applauds all the volunteers that help make this little place shine.
- b. Community Futures Whitehorse Plains is a non-profit funded by the government that offers business advice, assistance with creating business plans, loans, help throughout the lifespan of the business, offers creative community growth grants and COVID-19 recovery grants. This past year four \$5000 grants were awarded. Community Futures Whitehorse Plains also runs the Shop Local Win Big program at various craft sales throughout the region.

8. Questions from the Public

- a. Without having any events for the past six months, what financial position will the club be in for the next six months?
 - The club has been around for a very long time and over the lifespan it has had an amazing history of future minded prudent people. We have \$35,000.00 in our savings account which is a surplus and it is currently paying bills. Our hydro averages \$750 per month. The current board is keenly aware and grateful of the contributions. This buffer is keeping the club running, but the board doesn't want to use it all up. During COVID-19 the RV rent and running the coffee drive is helping to pay some bills.
- b. What comprises the nearly \$10,000.00 in building expenses?
 - This amount reflects the 2019 calendar year and includes the cost for a fire alarm upgrade as well as \$3,000.00 in club cleaning expenses. The current financial statements were very recently reviewed by the board and while the club does not have it's normal revenue, it also does not have the costs. Finances are being watched very carefully. Thank you for the questions.

2021 President's Report

Thank you to all that are attending our AGM today as we continue to operate through these challenging times. For those that attended our AGM last year and may be thinking "*didn't you just have your AGM?*", well...you are not far off. Last year we held our AGM in September due to Covid and wanting to stick it out in hopes that we could have it in person, which we did before we moved into code red shortly after in the fall. This past year has continued to be a quiet and challenging year for the Community Club as our doors have remained closed since March of 2020. The Board has continued to meet each month virtually via Zoom to discuss items of importance and repeatedly assess the changing landscape and how that affects our club and how we operate.

Without hosting in person events, fundraisers, and programming, the focus has been on keeping afloat by applying for grants, hosting some online fundraising events, making usage of our outdoor rink when it was permissible, moving our long-term renovation plans forward as best we can, while still maintaining our building (new heat detectors, upgraded Wi-Fi etc.) ...all in which you will hear more about shortly from our board members.

One of the most noticeable accomplishments this year was the removal of the old curling rink that was previously located directly behind us. In joint discussions with the Municipal Council, we came to a decision to have the building removed to allow for green space and possible future recreation opportunities. In the mid 1980's curling faded out and the area was used for skating lessons, casual skating and the odd jam pail tournament. With health and safety concerns of the dilapidated building, the demolition was done just as the start of the school kicked off in September. I would like to thank Council and the Community Club board for working together on achieving this goal. It is now time to move forward with a new green space and start thinking about future recreation ideas.

Before we ask Rita to take us through our Financial Report, I would like to make a few acknowledgements and thanks starting with Lorraine Freiboth and Stephanie Carvalho who have both been on the Board for the past 2 years serving as our head of Events/Fundraising and Rental bookings respectively. Prior to covid Lorraine and Stephanie were two of the most active people on our board. Lorraine led the charge on numerous events such as the End of Summer bash, Pictures with Santa, kids' carnival, craft sale as well as other fundraising initiatives such as the coffee drive and most recently Kinsmen 50/50 with the SFX School PAC. Lorraine also did all the heavy lifting in dispelling the myth and getting the Community Club's liquor license which will be instrumental for future events and fundraisers at the club.

If there has been a booking at the club over the past couple of years (blood donor drives, flu clinics, elections, socials, birthdays and other private rentals etc.) you name it, and it was coordinated and booked by Stephanie. They have both done so much for the club over this time and on behalf of the rest of the board, I would like to say thank you for your time and energy towards our club and the community. Both Lorraine and Stephanie's terms are up at the end of April and will be stepping down to focus on increased responsibilities at work and at home. Stephanie will be welcoming their newest member to her family this summer. On behalf of the Board, we wanted to show a small gesture of appreciation for your time serving as a volunteer board member for the club with this gift card.

I would like to say a big thank you to Penny Schoonbaert at Community Futures Heartland White Horse Plains who has been a huge supporter of ours over the years and helping us secure funding and support both before and during covid. I would like to thank Terry Leslie for chairing yet another AGM for us. You always do a fantastic job. I would like to extend my gratitude towards the Municipal Office for their support, collaboration, and financial assistance both prior and during covid. This has been a huge help as it has allowed us to cover many of our operational costs when no money has been coming in. And last but definitely not least...the Board members, volunteers and other subcommittee members for another year of collaboration, dedication and support as we wouldn't be able to operate without you! I will also be stepping down as President and from the board after 3 years of service. This was the first board that I have been a part of, and it has been a great experience working along side all of you. I have learnt lots and I look forward to helping out and seeing you at future events!

Finally, I wanted to encourage the community members of SFX, as 'partial owners' of the club, to volunteer and provide us with feedback and suggestions. Your support, effort and contributions are appreciated as we collectively work together in a safe reopening of our community club. If you haven't volunteered in the past, please do. It is a perfect way to meet the great people who live here and feel good about supporting the town.

Events, Fundraising & Grants – Lorraine Freiboth & Jaclyn Belton

Lorraine

The most obvious aspect of this past year has been covid. Our last year's AGM was postponed so our year overall has been a shorter one. Because of covid we amalgamated events and fundraising. The focus of events essentially shifted to covid friendly activities and initiatives to raise money to pay our bills. Everyone took on submitting grant applications.... And there have been many!

We did a storybook pathway at the park for Halloween. This was in the peak of one of the shutdowns and was a good way to encourage family time, physical activity and reading. The boards themselves belong to the club now and we can re-use them anytime with a new book in the future.

We applied for the FCC Agri-spirit Fund, which is a grant for up to \$25000. We will hear back in August for this.

We are excited to collaborate and share both the effort and revenue equally, rather than compete against one another for community support and generosity in two fundraising initiatives:

- 1) The Kinsmen Raffle is ongoing. It is a \$30000 cash prize or a 4 x 4 ford vehicle. I've posted to Instagram & Facebook a little bit but will pump this up closer to the draw date in June. So far we have raise \$1700.
- 2) A community 50/50. We've submitted an application with the LGCA for this and will use Funding Change as a platform.

The community club will lead and ultimately be responsible for both raffles. Both will promote sales through contact lists, Facebook and Instagram. Regardless of sales, the club will donate 50% of the profits to the school which they will put 100% of said funds towards costs incurred replacing the old condemned play structure with new, safe equipment. Both organizations are to gain, as when kids are at the club or the school, they play on the structure. The community club will put 100% of their funds raised towards expenses associated with desperately needed renovations at the club.

Although from this point, primarily due to work demands and covid, I am stepping back from the Community Club Board I have full intention of seeing these two fundraisers through and will remain on the events subcommittee to help with future events.

Jaclyn

Due to the Covid 19 pandemic, most of our programming and fundraising opportunities came to a full stop. However, the Manitoba Government provided us with an opportunity to apply for up to \$15,000 in funding to help with our organization - this opened up in November to eligible businesses and organizations that have been impacted by the pandemic. In applying, I was able to secure SFXCC the full \$15,000 in 3 payments which occurred in December, January, and March. We are very grateful for this assistance from our government, as it will allow us to put this funding towards the further development of our community centre as a whole - and hopefully 2021 will allow us to enjoy all of the activities and events that bring us together!

Rink, Grounds & Maintenance – Joerg Zimmerman

In the 2020/2021 season the following activities were performed at the SFX CC RINK & GROUNDS:

- Due to COVID-19 restrictions, the ice went in late. We started to put in the ice in early 2021. With the help of volunteers and the fire fighters we had it up and running in no time.
- The members of our Mystery SFX group, our Thursday nights men's night members donated white tarps to the Club, which we used to brighten up the dark asphalt surface with the hopes of getting an extended season in spring, when the sun is already stronger.
- COVID-19 health orders were relaxed and outdoor practices were allowed in February.
- The St. Eustache Minor Hockey Association approached us and asked if they could run outdoor practices at the SFX CC rink. We agreed as this gave about 41 families from SFX the opportunity to put their kids on the ice for regular practices. We had about three weeks of minor hockey practices on the SFX CC rink, while still allowing ample time during the week and on the weekends for the rink to be used by the rest of the community.

- The little outdoor shelter we the volunteers built helped to keep the wind away and worked well – the warm-up shack remained closed, and all other COVID related health orders were followed.
- The rink was used frequently during the weekends and I often saw people enjoying the rink during other weeknights.

For the 2021/2022 season we are planning the following:

- Roller hockey will soon start up again
- Depending on the COVID-19 situation we will assess the situation for this winter's activities on the ice
- Maintenance Saturday(s) in fall, where we fix/service the rink, the Zamboni and the tractor
- We can hopefully start with the initial flooding of the rink after Halloween
- Another long season of fun on the SFX ICE

For the above 2021/2022 activities we need volunteers with the following skills:

- Enthusiastic rink flooders and snow shovelers (strong back, weak mind preferred)
- Zamboni and Snowblower apprentices (training will be provided – graduation guaranteed, so I can go back shoveling)
- Mechanics to service the Zamboni and tractor (I don't know how an oil filter looks like)
- Handy and not so handy people (minimum skill: holding a hammer)
- Moral support is always appreciated

Social Media – Ashley Reay

- **Covid Update:** This has been an unconventional year with a lot of uncertainty and continuous changes in restrictions and operation requirements. Though we were not able to provide the same services, programs and events over this past year, we used Facebook and our website to communicate updates of the community club and our current status.
- **Remembrance Day memorial video:** due to the gathering restrictions, SFX Historical Group was not able to host their Remembrance Day ceremony at the Municipal building, with the help of the RM in supplying the photos, and Rita Tully scanning them, we were able to create a slide show for the community to remember together, yet apart.

- **Skating Rink:** with the constant change in restrictions, we used Social Media and our website to work on keeping the community up to date with the current restrictions. We also used Facebook to recruit volunteers to help with the ice.

Renovations – Joel Martens

Over this past year, we continued to move forward with our plans to renovate the club.

We are currently working with electrical and mechanical engineers to incorporate the existing systems into the finalized design. Once the drawings are complete, we will reach out to local contractors and suppliers to price the work.

Over the next year, we plan to focus on fundraising and applying for additional grant opportunities. We need to ramp up our fundraising efforts, so we can match available grant opportunities. Most grant applications require a percentage of matched contributions. We are hopeful to be out of this pandemic and in a position to plan fundraising events soon.

All our progress to date has been largely in part of the generous support of the Community Futures program. They have been working with us over the last few years to support the development of plans for the renovations. Additionally, this past year, they provided additional support for the operating expenses for the community club.

Rentals – Stephanie Carvalho

The Community Club has been closed Since March of 2020.

We have been able to open the club for specific events such as the Flu Clinic in November 2020 which was held by Southern Health. The flu clinic ran smoothly and we had positive feedback from our community that all protocols were followed! Southern Health hired a cleaning company to ensure all areas were properly sanitized! Thank you Southern Health.

We have also been able to set up an agreement with St. Francois Xavier School to have them use the Community Club for Phys-ed class during the cold winter days. We were grateful we were able to provide a warm place for the children in the community.

We look forward to being able to open fully again. Being able to rent out the club to our community and hosting many events.

Programs – Glen Dyck

This has been my third year on the board looking after the programming offered from the community club. Due to covid our Spring Sports is the first program we have put on since covid hit last year in March. Last week was the kickoff to our programming. I am happy to say that we have 100 kids playing soccer and 23 playing baseball so the park will be buzzing this spring from April 27th to June 17th.

Due to social distancing guidelines, we had to space things out a little more this year. Baseball remains on Tuesday evenings at the park from 6:30-7:30pm, while soccer is now spread out between Wednesday and Thursday evenings. The current restrictions only allow groups/teams of 10 kids to practice and scrimmage together, so we adjusted our setup to adapt to that.

I wanted to say thank you again to Lori Dyck my wife Amber, Janis Siemens and to Lee-Anne Brewer (who will be taking over Programming after my departure), for all of your assistance in getting things organized.
